DES MOINES WOODTURNERS MEETING (AAW Chapter 158) Saturday, May 16th,1:00 p.m., at the Woodsmith Store, 10320 Hickman Road, Clive, IA.

Member Donna Byers will demonstrate her method of turning and finishing pens and pencils. She'll also explain and demonstrate how a variety of kit projects can be made on a pen mandrel and cover the various drill bit sizes used, bushing styles and sizes, brass tubes used and tools needed to make pieces fit well.

In addition, other types of mandrels will be shown to make turned disks for nontubular projects including those that fit in a Jacobs chuck, 4-jaw scroll chucks and others that attach directly to your headstock spindle. Once acquainted with these mandrels, it's amazing the things you can design and make on your own.

Beginners and everyone else, please bring in your Show 'n' Tell items for our final meeting of the spring season. Everyone likes to see the variety of projects you turn in your shop.

Below, various members volunteered to try the 'Gizmo' hollowing system with either the laser guide or the 'CutterVision' attachments. Also demonstrated were the 'Down n' Out' tail stock manager, an array of components for their vacuum chuck system, the 'Dust Guzzler' dust collection port and various hand wheels to adapt most lathes to their vacuum chucking system. In addition, a three wheel bowl steady that doesn't require a hoop and a variety of cutting bars for the Gizmo articulated hollowing system.


Jim Hogue reported brisk sales of his special turning wood and we'd like to thank everyone who contributed to the free will lunch offering.



IOWA STATE FAIR WOODTURNING ENTRIES

Just a reminder to get busy on your lowa State Fair woodturning entries. The deadline to get your entry tags is July 1, 2015 for the wood projects

division. Your projects don't have to be in until August 8th. Locals can actually drop them off on the 2nd floor of the Cultural Building on the Iowa State Fair grounds on that date.

You may enter on line or you can go to the east end of the lower level of the Administrative building at the fair grounds and buy your entry tags. For on-line entry go to: <u>https://www.iowastatefairentry.org/login.aspx</u>

It's easy to enter. Get the number of entry tags you think you'll need. You don't have to know what you'll enter or what category it will go into until you ship or hand deliver your entries to the fair grounds. You'll complete each tag you purchase and attach one to each project. That's it.

Here are the entry categories for wood turned items:

- 1 Bowls
- 2 Box, snap lid or threaded
- 3 Hollow vessel
- 4 Household item (rolling pin, salt-pepper mills, utensils, candle holders, etc.)
- 6 Pens, pencils, seam rippers, etc.
- 7 Seasonal such as ornaments, tree toppers

- 8 Segmented work
- Stylized (sculpted or other stylized embellishments)
- **10** Any other wood turned object

5 Jewelry

You might note that the Iowa State Fair superintendent has the right to move your submission to the appropriate class if it is improperly submitted.

2015 BOOTH VOLUNTEERS NEEDED PLEASE SIGN UP TO HELP AND JOIN IN THE FUN

Believe it or not the 2015 Iowa State Fair is only 13 weeks or about 90 days away!

Many of you participated in our demonstration booth last year. It was a last minute, first ever opportunity to put on an interactive demonstration in front of an audience of this magnitude. We gained a great deal of experience over the course of eleven days. It was also a great deal of fun to watch young and old rush over to see what was going on when they heard the sound of a spindle roughing gouge applied to a piece of rotating square stock. Items turned



during the demonstration were then placed on a table for the audience to purchase. Many times they were spoken for before they came off the lathe. In some cases, custom variations were requested and we accommodated them whenever practical. This year we're hoping for a sizeable inventory of member pre-turned projects to sell as well.

The purpose of our involvement is many fold. First, it provides EXPOSURE to a large number of people and SHOWS what WOODTURNING is all about. With visual aids we can TEACH how we get bowl blanks and spindle stock from harvested tree logs. We answer visitor questions and furnish information about woodturning organizations. It provides RECRUITMENT opportunities for membership in our Chapter as well as other Chapters around the state. Visitors have the opportunity to purchase hand crafted woodturned items for themselves or as gifts, which extends our reach as they are shared with friends and relatives of the buyer. At the same time the sales provide REVENUE for the Iowa State Fair (15%), the State of Iowa (6%) as well as our own treasury. It helps fund the growth of our Chapter and support future educational, training and support activities. This is all done in a setting where a wide variety of woodturned items are displayed on the viewing floor and compete for the judges ribbons.

So come join the fun. We need to fill over 66 slots for booth duty at the fair. That's only furnishing two people per shift (three 4 hour shifts a day for eleven fair days). For the morning and afternoon shifts, often 3 or 4 people are needed, especially on weekends when traffic is heavy. August 13^{th} to August 23^{rd} , shifts are 9 - 1, 1 - 5 and 5 - 9. WORDS TO TURN BY - Some Light Along the Path

Reprinted with permission of author Robert Gulley. rgulley@wood-elegance.com Originally appeared in Woodturning Design Woodturning has its own language, like every field of endeavor. Some words and concepts may be familiar depending on one's background in

woodworking, but many of the terms are specialized, and frankly, a bit strange-sounding! FINAL - continued from the April meeting bulletin.

Tailstock - The tailstock is the movable assembly opposite of the headstock which slides along the bed and provides support for workpieces. The tailstock has a locking mechanism to keep it secured to the lathe bed, as well as a means for allowing the wood to spin while applying pressure to the wood. Something to consider when buying a lathe is the ease with which you can secure the wood and release it. Some lathes have short clamp/handle combinations which are hard to secure and release.

Tear-out - Tear-out is the result of uneven cutting across the surface of wood which has caused fibers to be torn rather than cut. The wood fibers are basically like straws which can stretch and then snap back below the surface of the wood. A common misconception

concerning tear-out is that it leaves a raised surface. In reality it is the opposite—the fibers which have been torn are below the surface, which means more wood must be removed to smooth the surface.

Often the cause of tear-out is a dull tool, but can be caused by soft spots, knots or burls, or other imperfections in the wood.

Tool Rest - The tool rest is an adjustable part of the lathe (usually in the shape of a 'T')

which fits into the banjo and provides support for the turning tool. Tool rests are extremely important because they must support the tool while encountering significant downward force as the wood is spinning. When looking for a lathe make sure the tool rest and banjo combination work well and that the controls are easy to

operate. The tool rest must be able to be raised and lowered freely when needed, as well as be of sufficient size to prevent frequent adjustment. Turners typically acquire two or three tool rests to accommodate differently sized pieces of wood.

Wrapping it up - I am quite sure there are terms you will encounter which I have not covered in this series, especially since different folks and even different countries have varying terms for tools, cuts, and wood properties. Stav safe, have fun, and keep those shavings flying!

Taxes & Giving (Source: <u>http://www.smartgivers.org/taxes and giving</u>)

Make sure your contribution is tax-deductible. All 501(c)(3) organizations can accept contributions and offer donors a tax deduction to the full extent of the law. Make sure to ask an organization if they are a 501(c)(3) organization before you make a donation.

How to receive tax-deductions for your charitable donations: To claim deductions, you'll need to fill out the tax form 1040 (the long form, which allows you to itemize deductions on Schedule A). You can find it at the IRS website. You don't receive any tax breaks if you fill out the short form or take standard deductions.



Gifts of clothing or household items (equipment, tools, accessories, books, videos) will be deductible only if the items are in "good used condition or better." Single items for which the donor has received a qualified appraisal and taken a deduction of more than \$500 are not subject to this rule. Nor are food, paintings, antiques, art objects, jewelry, or collections.

Contributions of cash, checks, or other monetary gifts, regardless of amount, must be substantiated by a bank record or a written communication from the charity showing the name of the charity, the date of the contribution, and the amount.

Gifts of stocks and other securities: The best stocks to donate are those that have increased in value and that you've held for more than a year, particularly those producing a low yield. In order to preserve tax advantages, it is critical that the securities themselves are transferred to an organization rather than proceeds from a sale.

Appreciated Securities or Mutual Funds- If you donate securities that have increased in value, you pay no capital gains tax and are entitled to a charitable deduction for the full fair market value of the stock.

Depreciated Securities- Rather than contributing depreciated stock, sell the stock and contribute the cash for a charitable deduction.

Deductions for volunteering: Although you can't deduct the value of time or services donated to an organization, you can deduct any costs that are incurred during volunteering, such as gas mileage or the cost of a volunteer uniform.

Donations to Des Moines Woodturners Inc., a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, are 100% tax deductible. Please consider us in your estate and tax planning.

Back to Basics Bowl Turning showing Tool and Process Technique

I explain and show you how I turn a bowl. I will show you a very simple way of how to get a curve every time! My method of showing seems logical to me but very few people use it. All will be explained in the demo; even the seasoned bowl turners will learn something.

Platter including Design and Ergonomics, also Colored Rimed Platter

Probably my favorite turning to make. We discuss ergonomics, shape, form, and how the bowl gauge is sharpened and its use. The draw cut, push cut, micro bevel, shear cut, and the wing cut. The coloring adds a real aesthetic quality to the piece. You will like it or hate it, but done well and on the right piece of wood can look awesome.

Scorched Ash Bowl with Colored Lid

A simple turned ash curved bowl with a slight turned over rim, which is then scorched and textured to emphasize the grain.

The lid is colored maple with a simple handle to compliment the simple curves of the bowl. I will show one of my coloring techniques.

Square Oriental Box

A square version of my original rectangular winged box. This piece needs to be turned fast in order to cut the corners cleanly. Tool control and position of bevel on the bowl gauge is equally important as is where to leave support in order to cut the wings. The base eventually ends up as a box and with the addition of a square cut lid with a handle the overall piece can be very aesthetic depending on proportion. I will explain in detail the whole process from start to finish.

We now have firmed up the lodging at Hilton Garden Inn in downtown Lincoln, easy to get to off I-80 and 10 minutes from the DEMO site. The address is 801 R Street in the Haymarket area, an old part of Lincoln that has been refurbished with great restaurants and shopping. When making a reservation make sure to indicate that you are with a "Great Plains Woodturners Group" and you will get a reduced rate of \$119. The Hilton Garden Inn is holding rooms for Friday and Saturday evening, if people wish to stay overnight.

The DEMO will be held on Saturday, July 11, 2015 at Kurth Contracting, 3901 South 6th Street beginning at 9:00 am and concluding at 4:00 pm.


