DES MOINES WOODTURNERS MEETING (AAW Chapter 158) Saturday, October 18th, 1:00 p.m., at the

Woodsmith Store. Member Daniel Henderson will share with us how he built the jigs and turned these decorative tabletop and wall hangings. Daniel won a ribbon at the Iowa State Fair for one of his wall hangings.

The process involves building a jig to safely hold a multitude of square spindles, all sized the same. A turning is done

somewhat like you'd see on a Roman shield. Then the spindles are removed and rotated back in the frame and turned a second time. The spindles are removed a final time and rearranged to suit the artist. Then the spindles are edge glued together and if wanted, an outside shape can be cut on the bandsaw or scrollsaw as seen in the one in Daniel's left hand. I doubt this technique has ever been

demonstrated before at one of our meetings so plan to attend and see for yourself how it's done.



We'll have a Beginners and All Other Show and Tell area again this month so all you beginners, show us what you've been doing. Everyone else please bring your work too. Everyone enjoys looking at the work of others so please continue to bring in what you've been turning in your shop. If you're looking to have your work critiqued, we'll have an area for that as well and we'll get to as many as we can.

**SEPTEMBER MEETING REVIEW** – Chapter member and Program Chair Jack Rolison demonstrated how he dyes his projects and how he creates a high-gloss finish over the dye using Starbond CA.

In case you didn't take notes, here are Jack's QUICK INSTRUCTIONS.

**NOTE:** Run lathe at low speed to perform CA application, polishing and wax applications.

- 1. Leave project on lathe, make sure all sanding marks are removed from your project.
- 2. Apply three coats CA. (Starbond Med Thin EM-40) Be sure to wear neoprene gloves, eye wear, proper ventilation.
- 3. If any ridges or low spots, sand with 320 or 400.
- 4. Apply four more coats of CA. If any ridges or low spots, sand again with 320 or 400.
- 5. Clean with pad dampened with accelerator, then Apply three more coats of CA and sand with 600 grit. Pads made from sections of "Rags in a Box" in the cube box from home centers, not standard paper towels. NOTE: NEVER USE CLOTH RAGS of any kind at lathe while lathe is running!
- 6. Apply three more coats of CA and then sand with wet and dry 1000 grit, 1500 grit, 2000 grit, 3000 grit.
- 7. Wipe clean with paper towel and polish with "3M Machine Polish, #B" (Automotive store) using paper applicator
- 8. Apply "Plastix" liquid wax using paper towel applicator (Walmart, 10 oz bottle)

### 2015 IOWA STATE FAIR - WANTED - SPARE SCRAP LUMBER AND VOLUNTEER TURNERS

We're collecting and storing blanks to make spurtles, dibbles, and tops in advance for next years lowa State Fair. Bring it in by the piece or bags full. Even rough-cut, unsurfaced stock is fine. It just needs to be in safe to turn condition. Here's what we need.

For spurtles, we'd like 9 to 12 inch lengths of at least 1 inch square lumber or larger in hardwoods such as Alder, Beech, Birch, Cherry, Hard Maple, Soft Maple, Sycamore or even Poplar.

For dibbles we need at least 1 3/4" inch square stock that's at least 7 to 10 inches long. We can use any species of hardwood including Alder, Ash, Beech, Birch, Boxelder, Butternut, Cherry, Elm, Gum, Hackberry, Hard Maple, Hickory, Oak, Poplar, Soft Maple, Sycamore, and Walnut.

For tops we need at least 2 inch square stock by at least 3 inches long, same species as listed for dibbles.

We'll collect these and parcel them out to volunteers willing to make these items in their shop and bring them in to sell at next years fair. Having 800 or more pre-turned and finished items wouldn't be too many to have on hand.

**NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT -** Fall is election time and our nominating committee has been making contact with members to seek out volunteers to fill both officer positions as well as board positions. At the November 15th meeting, attending members will decide whether to accept the slate presented by the committee. All nominees have agreed to accept the position and be 2015 members of AAW at the national level as well as a member of our local chapter. Thanks to Rob Beattie and Dave Yearian for co-chairing the committee and filling the slate for next year. See Page 4 concerning other chapter volunteers needed.

They come with either 28" or 52" long beds and optional tilt-away tail stocks and optional pneumatic system to make raising and lowering the monster tail stock a snap. Robust also makes a **Sweet Sixteen** disguised as a 16" spindle lathe. It's also a 32" bowl lathe and extended bed spindle lathe. The removable gap section in the bed makes it so. It can be used on a bench top or you can purchase the steel leg set for it. Then there is the **Independence**, a lathe designed exclusively for the seated turner. ## **WORDS TO TURN BY - Some Light Along the Path**

Woodturning has its own language, like every field of endeavor. Some words and concepts may be familiar depending on one's background in woodworking, but many of the terms are specialized, and frankly, a bit strange-sounding! Continued from the September meeting bulletin.

#### **Turning Between Centers**

As mentioned last month, turning between centers involves turning a piece while held between the headstock and tailstock, usually with the grain running parallel to the bed of the lathe. Some folks use a chuck to hold the headstock end even for spindles, but this is more commonly done when making goblets or vases.

Like faceplate turning discussed below, the meaning of turning between centers has blurred slightly, so it is important to distinguish which method is being discussed from the context of the article.

# **Chuck**

A device which holds the workpiece on the lathe, and there are numerous types and options, far too many to cover here. Some of the most common are the scroll chuck (also called a 4-jaw chuck), the collet chuck, the Jacobs chuck, and the vacuum chuck. In essence all of these tools are used to hold the wood onto a lathe,

with the main difference in how they accomplish this task.



By far the most common is the scroll or 4-jaw chuck, with four *jaws* to grip the wood. These jaws move together to expand or contract along a section of the wood to grip the wood at the headstock.

A collet chuck is a different type of design which relies on pressure to hold a small tapered stem. These chucks are common in metalworking, but have great usefulness in woodturning as well.

Similarly a Jacobs chuck is familiar to anyone who has used a modern power drill, as most of these come with Jacobs' chucks. These are also

useful for holding small stems or bases. Sometimes a Jacobs chuck may be used also at the tailstock end for drilling purposes, such as for setting the depth of a hollow form or box.

A vacuum chuck is designed to use a vacuum pump (or even a shop vac!) to hold a piece of wood by suction, creating a vacuum. This holding method is great for finishing off the bottom of a bowl after it has been hollowed out, but does require a bit of finesse in terms of tool control. I would not make this one of your first purchases or creations until you are comfortable with the basic aspects of turning bowls, platters, and other faceplate work.

There are also various jam chucks and specialized homemade chuck that can be used.

#### **Dovetail Recess**



A recess on the workpiece which narrows slightly from the base into which a set of jaws can fit, such as those on a dovetail jawed scroll chuck. This recess is called a "dovetail" because of its shape, similar both to the joinery technique by the same name, and the general shape of a dove's tail (clever, eh?!) This shape has proven it's worth in flatwork joinery, and as a temporary holding design for a lathe it works great. While the recess narrows up from the base, the jaws are widest on the end and then narrow to form an interlocking grip which is very solid. Unless you are pretty heavy-

handed with your tools or there is damage to the wood in some way, this grip is very secure.

**AAW CHAPTER SCHOLARSHIPS** - Once again, all AAW chapters are eligible to apply for at least one woodturning scholarship to either Arrowmont School of Arts and Crafts or the John C. Campbell Folk School. A total of twenty-eight scholarships will be awarded to selected AAW chapter members

To be nominated for a scholarship, chapter members must be AAW members and be chosen through a process authorized by their AAW chapter officers. The deadline for applications is **November 15, 2014**.
