Next **DES MOINES WOODTURNERS MEETING** will be Saturday, January 12th, 1:00 p.m., at the Woodsmith Store, 10320 Hickman Road, Clive, IA.



Mounting your project on to your lathe!

Will Zitterich. Dave Yearian and Tad Tadlock will be presenting the program at the January monthly meeting looking at the many different ways a piece of wood can be mounted on the lathe. The mounting should be safe and secure even though the piece is irregularly shaped. The equipment shown will include different drive centers, tail stock centers, and faceplates. Chucks come in all sizes and have many different features. You will be able to evaluate chuck accessories to see which ones will be the most useful in your lathe work. The presentation will include a vacuum chuck, a Rubber Chuckey, a iam chuck. Easy Wood's chuck, a Vicmarc chuck, a Sorby chuck, a screw chuck, jumbo jaws chuck, and a collet chuck. A number of different pieces of wood (including a Bowl saver blank, a burl, a tree trunk and a maybe a piece of "crappy" wood) will be mounted on the lathe in different configurations to show how it affects the grain orientation in the final bowl.

Much of the discussion and presentation will be about the proper use of these lathe accessories as well as explaining some of the disadvantages and in some cases the difficulties in using them. You will also be able to ask questions throughout the presentation. This will help you decide which lathe accessories will be included in a future purchase list as well as help you decide the accessories that are not needed.

Of course, we'll have our monthly **Show 'n Tell** so plan to bring your projects or woodturning related items to show, regardless of your current skill level. Members like to see the work of others at all skill levels and hear about the challenges you faced creating your project as well as how you overcame them. (See the **Critiquing** note on page 3.)

DECEMBER MEETING REVIEW – Dick Meuler, Rob Beattie, and Will Zitterich "Finishing" your project!



The program was a panel of members with a variety of finishing experience. Dick Meuler, Rob Beattie and Will Zitterich discussed the various classes of finishes along with reasons why you might choose one over another. The classes were Evaporative, Reactive and Coalescing, all of which are film or top coat finishes. Oils were also explained as penetrating finishes that don't build up on top of the wood surface. One suggestion was to practice and experiment with different products and then select those that meet your preferences for display only projects (that are seldom handled) and another for utilitarian projects (that are touched and handled often). Then, just keep using what you've learned and keep it as

simple as possible. Preferred finishes on one species of wood may not be your preference on a different species. Proper sanding, prior to finishing, was also discussed. There is an infinite amount both good and misleading information available on-line. Books on finishing by Bob Flexner were mentioned as a reliable source.

DECEMBER'S SHOW and TELL produced a nice selection of turned items by the following members: **Kathy Carmen, George Takacs, Roy Skarin, Deb Berry, Harold Haines, Tad Tadlock, Jack Kennedy, Roger Nass, Roger Francis, Vikki Morain** and **Tom Whalley**. Roger Francis's project was the lawn mower wheel you see in the photo. This is a great example of utilizing woodturning skills (making an outside segmented ring to fit an undersized wheel Roger had bought) so his lawn mower would mow evenly. It is hoped that others will bring in a utilitarian piece made to fit a need around the house like Roger did. ALL ABOUT SANDPAPER

At the December Chapter meeting, different types of finishing techniques were discussed including the ever-popular joy of "sanding". The information below may help to answer the age-old question: "What kind of sandpaper should I use"? beginning with...

Backing

In addition to paper, backing for sandpaper includes cloth (cotton, polyester, rayon), PET film, and "fiber", or rubber. Cloth backing is used for sandpaper discs and belts, while mylar is used as backing for extremely fine grits. Fiber or vulcanized fiber is a strong backing material consisting of many layers of polymer impregnated paper. The weight of the backing is usually designated by a letter. For paper backings, the weight ratings range from "A" to "F", with A designating the lightest and F the heaviest. Letter nomenclature follows a different system for cloth backings, with the weight of the backing rated J, X, Y, T, and M, from lightest to heaviest. A flexible backing allows sandpaper to follow irregular contours of a workpiece; relatively inflexible backing is optimal for regular rounded or flat surfaces. Sandpaper backings may be glued to the paper or form a separate support structure for moving sandpaper, such as used in sanding belts and discs. Stronger paper or backing increases the ease of sanding wood. The harder the backing material, the faster the sanding, the faster the wear of the paper and the rougher the sanded surface. PSA paper has a sticky back and is good to be used on large jobs that are likely to wear out the sandpaper.

Hook-and-loop paper uses a fuzzy backing that sticks to the bottom of a sander. It can be pulled off and reused before the abrasive on the paper wears out

Which abrasive to choose?

Obviously, it's important to choose the right abrasive for the job in hand, which means picking the right type of abrasive grain and the correct grit size. It helps enormously to know what's in abrasives, because they're all made differently.

Aluminum oxide sandpaper

The most common type of sandpaper--aluminum oxide--is useful as an all-around sanding paper. It is made by fusing the mineral bauxite, aluminum oxide. Normally brown or reddish-brown. This is a sharp, blocky mineral, the most common all-purpose woodworking abrasive for a very good reason. It is the only abrasive mineral that fragments under the heat and pressure generated by sanding wood. This characteristic is called friability and it's highly desirable. As you sand, aluminum oxide renews its cutting edges constantly, staying sharp and cutting much longer than other minerals. Aluminum oxide is also a relatively tough abrasive, which means its edges don't dull much before they fragment. Its excellent friability and toughness make it the longest lasting and the most economical abrasive mineral.

Silicon Carbide sandpaper

Silicon carbide is an abrasive made from coke and silica sand and is a very sharp and hard abrasive. It is used for sanding between coats of finish, painted or otherwise finished surfaces, rubber, plastic, non-ferrous metals and other types of materials. It cuts very well under light pressure and has self-sharpening properties and is normally black. Though aluminum oxide is the more commonly used abrasive for sandpaper, silicon carbide is used on some types of paper for smoothing wood finishes and the sanding of metal. With silicon carbide abrasives, the grain macro-fractures. This means it breaks into smaller pieces which act to re-sharpen it before it goes dull. Silicon carbide abrasives stay sharp until they die, but they die relatively quickly. It the least expensive option for belt sanders. There is only one kind of silicon carbide and it's harder and sharper than most aluminum oxides, making it the best choice for cutting hard materials like wood finishes, paint, plastic and metal. It's also a friable mineral, so hard that sanding soft wood won't make it fragment and renew its cutting edges. Though it will sand faster at first, it will dull more quickly than aluminum oxide. It is also generally more expensive than aluminum oxide.

Garnet sandpaper

Garnet is a very sharp grain that cuts very quickly when new. It fractures quickly, keeping it sharp. it is perfect for sanding wood end grains or for final finish sanding of wood. Garnet is very economical. Mostly found in sheet form.

Alumina Zirconia sandpaper

This sandpaper is made from a high-performance alloyed abrasive formed by Zirconia deposited in an Alumina matrix. An alloy of Aluminum Oxide and Zirconium Oxide. Designed for heavy duty stock removal for metal and wood, with self-sharpening characteristic. It normally works well for dimensioning wood. Normally, it is blue. It has a very long life and a fast cut rate even under heavy grinding stress. As the grain breaks down under heat and pressure, it fractures into smaller jagged pieces. Zirc, as the experts call it, is good at dissipating heat, letting the grain stay sharp for longer than most other man made and naturally mined grains. Its impressive durability makes it particularly effective on difficult to grind and exotic metals and it doesn't fragment much on wood. A fast solution with a long life, great for sanding wood, particularly the coarser grits.

Stearate Lubricant

Stearated sandpaper is also known as self-lubricating sandpaper. It is used primarily for sanding wood and paint finishes as well as metal. The applied lubricant or soap prevents clogging and extends the life of the sandpaper. Stearate A/O and S/C are dry sanding types of sandpaper. Stearate A/O (Aluminum Oxide) primarily used in bare wood or non-ferrous metal applications where loading of the material could occur. Stearate S/C (Silicon Carbide) is primarily used in between coats of finish. The added stearate acts as a dry lubricant while sanding on surfaces where wet sanding cannot be applied. Stearate S/C is not recommended for bare wood sanding and SOME water-based finishes. Instead look at our regular wet/dry S/C for water-based finishes.

Open Coat vs. Closed Coat

Open Coat is a coated abrasive product in which the abrasive grain covers approximately 50% to 70% of the coated side surface. Helps to retard loading of sticky or gummy materials such as softwoods or paint. Closed-

Drum Sander Tips

Heat is the main culprit that causes clogging. The best way to remedy some of this is to make light passes and use a belt cleaning stick periodically to remove any built-up particles in the abrasive. Dust build-up can also contribute to abrasives clogging and burning. Using a good dust collection with at least 1,000 cfm is ideal, as drum sanders produce a tremendous amount of dust that needs to be extracted. A shop vac just won't handle the amount dust that is created. Be sure to have decent filtration (30 micron or better) on any dust system you may use.

Did you know this? Make sure your wraps are not touching each other when on the drum. Keep at least a 1/16" gap between wraps. This will aid in cooling and dust removal from the sanding process. If you have purchased sandpaper rolls for your open arm sander recently and discovered the paper is shorter than it was before, this is the reason. It needs a space between the wraps.

Care of sanding belts

Klingspor recommends that you do not hang portable belts on a hook or peg. Instead keep your belts in a plastic bag or in a climate-controlled area. Typical standard life of a belt joint is one to two years.
