April 12th Demonstration Duane Groenenboom and Mark Hayes Iowa State Fair Products

Duane:

I started turning on my son's hand me down Shopsmith about 25 years ago and got hooked. Since then I upgraded to Jet 1440 and now am turning with a Powermatic 3520.

I've always enjoyed wood working but woodturning was special. I've explored segmented and bowl turning but didn't do much between center turning until after I took the Basic Wood turning class a few years ago. Since then, I have turned over 150 Christmas trees. I started using red

cedar and found that they sold quickly at the state fair. The red heart wood and white sap wood make a unique tree. Since then, I also turned trees from Bradford Pear, Sycamore, Maple and other species.

During the last year I have started experimenting using Cactus Juice to stabilize punky wood and using dyes with Cactus Juice on soft maple to get a different look of Christmas tree. Some of these dyed trees sold well at a craft sale so am interested to see if they will sell at the state fair.



Mark:

I am a lifetime woodworker following in the footsteps of my father and grandfather who were both carpenters and dabbled in woodworking. My first workshop consisted of a Shopsmith in the basement and a radial arm saw in the garage some 45 years ago. I have since built out a full workshop and enjoy some furniture making in addition to turning. The thing with furniture making it that it systematically provides windows between steps for turning.

My woodturning journey began in the fall of 2023 when I joined the DMWT. I started turning in February, 2024 and the obsession began. I took the basic woodturning and basic bowl turning classes offered by

the club and now help teach those classes.

I enjoy all forms of turning including spindles and bowls. I have developed a strong interest in embellishing and offset turning. Seldom do I turn identical items as I suspect I would become bored as a production turner.

A Word from Chapter President, Dennis Anderson

Did you know our Des Moines Chapter has 186 members from 53 different communities? Wow, what a resource of club members for sharing and learning from one another. Take time to meet someone you do not know and learn from what they are turning. What a great way to develop some new friendships!

We have a number of newer members. Just a reminder that safety is a priority when operating a lathe. Here is a list of safety recommendations from the American Association of Woodturners (AAW) that are great reminders to all of us regardless of experience level:

- Use a full face shield whenever the lathe is turned on.
- Tie back long hair, do not wear gloves, and avoid loose clothing or objects that may catch on rotating parts or accessories.
- Always check the speed of the lathe before turning it on. Use slower speeds for larger diameter or rough pieces, and higher speeds for smaller diameter and pieces that are balanced. Always start a piece at a slower speed until the work piece is balanced. If the lathe is shaking or vibrating, lower the speed. If the work piece vibrates, always stop the machine to check the reason.
- Check that all locking devices on the tailstock and tool rest assembly (rest and base) are tight before operating the lathe.
- Position the tool rest close to work, almost touching the wood. Check tool rest position often and as wood is removed, turn off the lathe and re-position the rest.
- Rotate your work piece by hand to make sure it clears the tool rest and bed before turning the lathe "on." Be certain that the work piece turns freely and is firmly mounted. A handwheel on the outboard side of the headstock simplifies this process of spinning the lathe by hand before turning on the switch.
- Be aware of what the turners call the "red zone" or "firing zone." This is the area directly behind and in front of the work piece this area is the most likely for a piece to travel as it comes off the lathe. A good safety habit is to step out of this zone when switching the lathe to the "on" position. When observing others turn stay out of the area.
- Hold turning tools securely on the tool rest, holding the tool in a controlled and comfortable manner. Always contact the tool rest with the tool before contacting the wood.
- It is safest to turn the lathe "off" before adjusting the tool rest or tool rest base (banjo).
- Remove the tool rest before sanding or polishing operations.
- Never leave the lathe running unattended. Turn the power off. Do not leave the lathe until it comes to a complete stop.

Summary of Logan Whittmer Demonstration March 8, 2025



Logan Whittmer presentation, Des Moines Wood Turners, March 8, 2025, Mall venue Logan Whittmer has been in publication work for 9 years and is currently the Managing Editor of the Popular Woodworking magazine. He spends as much time as he can turning on his lathes in his shop and has made a lot of turnings. This presentation will show the many different metals and methods of turning them that can be turned on woodworking lathes.

He explained why turners should consider turning metals. There are many things that you can do with metals that can't be done in wood. Metal ferrules can be turned for tool handles, brass can be made into a mallet head, metals can create an accent on a turning, metals can make a rim of a bowl, metals are easy to texture, and a metal accent can add balance to a work piece.

Metals softer than mild steel can be turned on a wood lathe with a turner's high speed woodworking tools. Copper is the easiest to turn, brass turns easily, bronze is the hardest to turn, and aluminum is easy to turn but shavings can stick to the turning tool.

Brass can be mounted in a wood working scroll chuck must be very tight. Begin with turning slowly as 300 rpm to make the brass perfectly round and then increase the speed. A round nose scraper works well, and the tools must be kept very sharp. And the cuts must be light cuts. A push cut or pull cut can be made with a spindle gouge or bowl gouge. Logan demonstrated by turning a piece of brass to make a mallet head. He added grooves with a skew and added texture with a texturing tool. He also demonstrated drilling a hole in the brass mallet head for the handle by using a brad point drill.

Logan demonstrated turning a bronze bushing to make a ferrule for a tool handle. The shavings are not stringy but more like dust. Scrapers and gouges work well. Epoxy should be used to attach the ferrule on the wood handle as super glue does not work well withstanding the heat generated by turning bronze.

Aluminum is not fun to turn as the shavings stick to the tool and they must be continually removed from the tool. Turning faster makes it worse as more heat is created. It is hard to get a real good surface cut, but the surface can be covered by using a texturing tool. The turning can be turned oH with a parting tool.

Pewter is ideal for melting and pouring in a mold to create a metal piece like a finial. It melts at 400 degrees. Logan melted a piece of pewter with a propane torch in a ladle. He turned a recess into a piece of wood for a mold and poured the molten pewter into it. Maple can be used but medium density fiber board works the best for a mold. As the pewter cools it shrinks and is easily removed from the mold. He removed the casting from the mold when it cooled. The finial created could be used on a box lid. He described how pewter can be used for a bowl rim by either making the rim separately from the bowl or cutting a groove in the bowl and pouring molten pewter into the groove.

Many turners have not used metal in their turnings. Logan's excellent demonstration and the information he provided was informative and turners now have a good understanding of using metals in turning. His presentation was enjoyable to watch and very much appreciated by turners.

Training News

2025 Woodturning Classes

General Information: You will receive an information packet by email approximately 1 month before the class. It contains a list of required accessories, location and safety information. A reminder will arrive about 1 week before the class. The fee is collected on the day of the class. There is no penalty for cancellation, but please let us know ASAP if you have to cancel.

Basic Woodturning: If you have not taken Basic Woodturning you will find it useful if you're new to turning, been away from the lathe for awhile or would just like a refresher. Enhance your spindle turning skills. It is a fun day and a confidence builder. In addition, it is the prerequisite for the other courses. DWMT provides the tools and wood. Homework is assigned between classes so you will need access to a lathe. Basic Woodturning is two consecutive Mondays, 8:30 to 5. Cost: \$40.

Basic Bowl Turning: This class touches on basics of wood harvesting, differences from spindle turning, and introduces the bowl gouge. You will practice on a Poplar blank before turning your Hard Maple bowl. The class is one full day. DMWT provides the tools and blanks, you provide the accessories and face shield. This is a one day class. Cost: \$20.

Basic Segmenting: This class will cover the basics of making segmented projects, from calculating segment angles and sizes, ring diameters needed, segment wood prep, gluing and clamping, to accurate cutting fixtures. You'll glue together furnished pre-cut segments and clamp them. Turning will be demonstrated but students won't be using the lathe in the class. Pre-cut segments for glue-up practice will be furnished. Bring paper and pencil to take notes. This is a one day class. Cost: \$20.

Basic Skew Chisel: This class will introduce students to the proper techniques and use of the tool as well as sharpening. Students will furnish their own skew chisel(s) (3/4 inch and up preferred). We will use the same accessories as in the Basic Woodturning Class. This is a one day class. Cost: \$20.

Basic Sharpening: The sharpening class will use lathe mounted sandpaper sharpening wheels and wooden dowels to teach the techniques of sharpening. This class is primarily for gouges but will also touch on a variety of other common traditional turning tools such as parting tools, skew, bedan and scrapers. In addition, sharpening hollowing tools, thread chasers, hook tools and common flat carbide cutters will be discussed. After practice, students will have the opportunity to sharpen their own tools using the Oneway Wolverine Sharpening system and CBN wheels. This is a one day class. Cost: \$20.

DMWT Woodturning Scholarship

The Des Moines Woodturners offer a scholarship program for the benefit of chapter members. Woodturning can be an expensive endeavor. The cost of equipment such as a lathe, bandsaw, chainsaw, sharpening system, buffing system and the myriad of items like drive centers, scroll chucks, live centers, adapters, jaws, and faceplates can mount rapidly. In addition is the cost of turning tools, embellishing tools, specialty tools and a host of accessories, supplies and finishing products, not to mention the cost of wood if you don't have the capacity to harvest your own.

By the same token, three and five day woodturning educational events are also expensive when located out-of-state. Travel costs, lodging and tuition can easily run \$1,000 to \$1,700 per event.

This scholarship is not intended as a source of financial aid for those who might otherwise not be able to afford the educational experience. Instead, it is offered as an incentive to those serious about woodturning who are willing to expand their skills and knowledge and bring those skill-sets back to share with our members in a variety of ways. The scholarship can provide recipients a 25% to 50% discount toward the overall cost of their attendance expenses.

The purpose of the scholarship is to expand personal woodturning skills and knowledge and share their experience with fellow members by:

- -Attending Chapter events and sharing their learning experience.
- -Showing examples of their work as a result of their learning experience.
- -Demonstrating what they learned at a chapter meeting, event, or class.
- -Sharing their overall learning experience and confidence building experience.
- -Encouraging members to expand their woodturning skills via similar educational experiences.
- -Volunteering for Chapter leadership positions (wide variety of opportunities).
